

A No-Baptism "Gospel"?

An incident occurred in rural Texas years ago, the story of which I remember. The denominational preachers in a small town proposed a "union meeting" in which all of them in the town would take alternate turns to preach. There was a certain Gospel preacher in the town who had not been consulted on the arrangement. When he heard about this meeting he called on the other preachers, requesting his turn to preach, and asking to have a time assigned to him. He was informed that an agreement had been made by all that the subject of *baptism* would not be mentioned – that they had agreed merely to "preach Christ" and say nothing about baptism. To their surprise the Gospel preacher promptly accepted the conditions, agreeing to preach without the mention of the word *baptism*. A night was assigned for his sermon, and he announced in advance the subject: "What Must I Do to Be Saved?"

Knowing the convictions of the Gospel preacher, people in the area wondered how he could preach on that subject under that kind of restriction not to mention baptism. They came from the necks of the woods and forks of the creeks all over the area to hear his sermon.

He preached with much animation and eloquence on salvation, and the love of God that brought salvation to man through Jesus Christ. Reaching the point of the question, "What must I do to be saved," he turned to Mark 16:15–16 and read the words of Christ: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and [doeth that thing I promised not to mention] shall be saved." He then read Acts 2:38: "Repent ye, [and do that thing I promised not to mention] for the remission of sins." And he read every verse in the New Testament on baptism, and called it "that thing I promised not to mention"!

It is a strange thing that denominational people will detour around such a plain and positive command, so simple to be understood and performed, so easy to accept and obey — and so much emphasized in the New Testament. When Philip preached Christ, he preached the kingdom of Christ, he preached the all-prevailing name of Christ, and he preached baptism into Christ:

Then Philip went down to the city of Samaria, and preached Christ unto them.... But when they believed Philip preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptized, both men and women (Acts 8:5–12).

Appointments!

sn't it amazing that Jesus made the appointment to meet with His disciples to give the "Great Commission" before He ascended?

Matthew 28:16 speaks of the appointment. Matthew 26:32 shows that before His death He set it. In Matthew 28:7-10 He mentioned it again after His resurrection. Let that sink in.

Jesus made an appointment and kept it, even though between the making of it and the keeping of it, He was betrayed, persecuted, executed, buried, and resurrected! It is safe to say that Jesus keeps His appointments!

That was the message of Peter in 2 Peter 3:2–3, 8–9. Even though many years may pass, even thousands of years, God keeps His promises. So if He promises to return and 2,000 years pass, is He still going to return? Yes, that is no different from a two-day promise to Him! Perhaps in the next day or two, or three, the way Jesus counts time, He may come again! He always keeps His promises!

There is another appointment that He gives us in His Testament. Hebrews 9:27 actually speaks of two appointments. One is to die and the second to stand before Him in Judgment. You will not miss these appointments. You will leave this flesh and blood. You will bow before Jesus and give account for every sin for which you have not been forgiven.

Did you know the word *appointed* is translated from a Greek word that is also translated "laid up"? In other words, there are other appointments that are waiting for the child of God. These wonderful promises are waiting for us:

- **Hope:** "For the hope which is laid up for you in heaven..." (Col. 1:5). This hope is appointed for you if you are God's child.
- **Crown:** "Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness..." (2 Tim. 4:8). Paul knew he had an appointment to wear a crown of victory in the eternal home.

Jesus brought us this hope and offers us this crown. And remember, He made an appointment to give the Great Commission so we would teach others about this hope and crown too! Let us always keep our appointments with Him.
